("Inspired" by an announced 2015 USPC puzzle by Craig Kasper)
Rules: Enter the digits 1, 3, 5, 7, 9 into the grid so that each digit (and one empty square) appears exactly once in each row and column. Numbers outside the grid are either Easy as ABC or Skyscraper clues: either the clue is the first digit that appears in the corresponding row or column from the direction of the clue, or it is the number of digits in the corresponding row or column that can be "seen" from that direction (higher digits block the view of lower digits).
Answer Entry: Enter the letters in the marked rows in order from left to right, separating each row's entry with a comma. Use a capital $X$ for empty cells.


# 15/09/17: <br> Slitherlink (Sudoku) by Carl Worth Theme: Clue Symmetry and Logic (Inspired by a contest entry from Scott Handelman) 

Rules: Standard Slitherlink Rules. Also, enter a number from 0 to 3 into each gray cell as additional slitherlink clues. Numbers in the gray cells cannot repeat in any row, column, or $2 x 2$ group of gray cells.
